Grounds	The grounds are enclosed neatly & subdivided for the various purposes. Tree planting is being continued - many little cypress trees seem to be making good headway. The garden has had a fine display of flowers of various kinds - it adds much to the appearance of the school. The play pavilion is today. The flag pole is in use today. Boys are under close supervision.	

Bldgs etc

The school room is well lighted & well ventilated. The walls, both in school & porch, need to be swept to free them of the summer's dust. Furniture is sufficient for present requirements. Equipment is fairly good - senior pupils can make additional articles in occup' periods. The library contains a good number of suitable books - if separated into groups suited to each grade, choice of books by pupils will be made easy. Permanent decorations is meagre - there are no really good pictures. The posted drawings of the Head Teacher are attractive. Sun tops & flowers are used freely & with good effect.

Records Grades for 1931 are needed in the Pupils' Register.

Organizⁿ

All grades are represented among the 18 pupils present today. Ages are approx normal except in the case of one girl who has, prior to entry here, been out of reach of a school. A suitable Line Table is in operation - sequences are suitable & time allotment good.

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COUNCIL JOTTINGS

GENERAL

Cr. Long pointed out that mistakes were often made by motorists on their way to Mirboo North not taking the left turn before reaching midway line in Boolarra township, owing to the finger-post being on the wrong side of the road. People frequently crossed the railway and took the wrong turn at Ashley's Hotel. He suggested that the finger post be removed to a spot where it could be more readily seen by motorists.

It was agreed to have the said sign shifted as suggested by Cr. Long.

Cr. Hare drew attention to a bad spot on road leading to Fox's bridge, in Boolarra riding. To be attended to.

Cr. Ronald referred to proposed lawn in the main street, Morwell, opposite railway goods sheds. He pointed out that permission had been given by Railways Commissioners to make use of a small portion of railway ground. A hedge and shrubs had been planted and he thought it now a suitable time to prepare the lawn. He suggested that the lawn be fenced off with concrete posts and chain. From enquiries he had made he found that 100 yards of second-hand chain could be purchased for 18.

The Engineer to inspect and submit report re cost, etc.

Cr. Hall said he had been asked to ascertain if the sanitary service at Boolarra Mechanics' Hall, and cost of same could be reduced.

It was considered that no alteration could be made in the present service.

Cr. Ronald drew attention to the danger caused by pedestrians walking along roadway leading to Morwell Recreation Ground when football matches and other functions were being held in the Grounds. He suggested that a footpath be made for people to walk on instead of having to go along the roadway.

The Engineer said a footpath had been made on the south side of road, close to fence, but nobody ever used it.

Cr. Auchterlonie: You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink.

Cr. Ronald: Well, I didn't know the path was there, but I am glad it is.

Cr. Walker suggested that scrub on some sharp bends on Jumbuk Road, near Ritchie's, be cut, as in their present state, the bends were dangerous. To be attended to.

Attention was drawn to a dangerous tree on road side close to J.

Wombat Bonus

A letter was received from Traralgon Shire agreeing to pay wombat bonus under same conditions as Morwell Shire, but suggesting that Rosedale Shire be included and asking that Morwell Shire convene a conference of group of Shires.

The President mentioned that the Narracan Shire had recently paid over £130 in bonuses on wombat scalps.

Cr. Ronald: That goes to show that wombats are increasing, and something should be done to deal with them.

Cr. Walker: There is a big crop of wombats to come off and I don't think we should rush into the matter.

The President: All the adjoining Shires must be in it, before we agree to

the matter. Council had first taken actions in the matter and it was resolved to refer the letter from Traralgon Shire to Warrego Shire and suggesting that they convene a conference.

Celebration Medals

A letter was received from Acting Premier stating Wednesday, 12th May will be a public holiday for the Coronation and medals will be presented to school children.

Cr. Auchterlonie: Is it necessary for any celebrations.

The President said that as an expression of loyalty, he thought something should be done. He suggested that a gathering be held in the Town Hall, where addresses suitable to the occasion might be delivered and children presented with medals.

Cr. Hare said it was likely that the King's Birthday Sports Committee would hold a sports meeting on that day. The medals could be presented before or during the sports.

It was said that if the medals were to be presented at the sports, a charge for admission could not be made.

Cr. Hare said a sports meeting could not be held unless a charge were made as a good deal of expense would be incurred.

Cr. Auchterlonie said he did not think a sports meeting would be a suitable place at which to present the medals.

Cr. Quigley said the usual sports meeting was of little interest to small children.

Cr. Ronald said he would like to see an impressive function.

Cr. Hare said they could not expect children from Jumbuk, Jeeralang and other outside places to come to Morwell to receive a medal.

Other councillors were of the same opinion.

Cr. Walker said school committees of the various schools might handle the matter.

Cr. Coleman suggested that a public meeting be held to consider the question, and after some further discussion it was resolved on the motion of Cr. Coleman, seconded by Cr. Hare, "That a public meeting be convened in the

Wandering Stock in Morwell at Night

Cr. Ronald moved: "That while appreciating the efforts of the Road Ranger to carry out his work satisfactorily, he be instructed to enforce more strictly the Council's regulations relating to wandering cattle and horses in the Morwell area at night."

In support of the motion, Cr. Ronald said that all ratepayers had contributed toward the cost of several hundred young trees that had been planted in various streets of the town, and which would in a few years become a valuable asset to the town and ratepayers just as those in Hazelwood Road, and other streets, had done. Yet, for the sake of slight personal gain, about one per cent of the ratepayers saw fit to turn into the streets at night, horses. These had already smashed down several trees and thereby damaged the assets of the other 99 per cent of ratepayers. To say the least, it was not an act of good citizenship and the Council could lead in creating a public opinion which would be a greater deterrent to offenders than Council Regulations.

Anti-Cancer Campaign

A letter was received from the Anti-Cancer Council setting out Morwell Council's quota at £200 and suggesting that municipalities combine their efforts.

Cr. Ronald said he would like to know what other Councils were doing in the matter and, if Yallourn would contribute their quota.

Cr. Hare asked if the quota stated had to be paid in one amount, or be spread over two or three years.

Cr. Auchterlonie did not think it was a matter for the Council to finance.

In answer to question as to whether the Council could legally vote money for the purpose suggested, the Secretary said that they could.

Cr. Walker said the subject was of great importance and could not be passed over lightly.

The President said the fight against cancer was in his opinion a national one. Action was taken with a view to bringing about national security and large sums were being spent by Federal Government on armaments, etc., for the defence of Australia. He thought it a matter for the Government to put up money to fight against the cancer plague. He contended that it was an obligation upon the Federal Government to do so.

Cr. Auchterlonie asked if the Anti-Cancer Council had approached the Federal Government about the matter. The President said he did not know. It was eventually resolved to hold

This pioneer farmer's work has stood the test of time

The importance of farm buildings, more than any others, lies in their relationship with the ground they stand upon. The people who built them and the crops and animals for which they were designed.

So concluded Dr Miles Lewis, Melbourne University lecturer in architecture and building and judge of this year's best old or renovated farm building competition at the Gippsland Agricultural Field Day at Warragul.

The competition, sponsored by the Australian Dairy Corporation, was run in conjunction with Victoria's 150th anniversary celebrations.

A total of 27 buildings were entered from west and south Gippsland, which is a significant area in relation to rural Victoria's past.

For instance, Churchill Island — just off the western shores of Phillip Island — was the site for the first farming enterprise in the state and the first European building in 1801, well before the settlement of Melbourne or western Victoria.

The area is also unique for its old farm milking sheds, as the competition revealed.

More often than not, old farm buildings — such as milking sheds — are still standing, purely by luck rather than good management.

Some farmers haven't bothered to pull down the old and have simply build the new right beside it. In other cases, they haven't been able to afford new buildings and have had to do with the old, while other buildings have been left because the rural industry they once served has ceased to be viable — take chicory, for instance.

An old milking shed on a property in Drimfield, south of Traralgon, won third prize in the competition and was described by Dr Lewis as a "more typical Gippsland farm building".

Dr Lewis and the present owner, Mr Frank Lawless, said the former 20-bale milking shed was constructed entirely of saw or axe-cut timber, probably from mesquite trees on the property. "There were no sawmills here at that time," Frank said.

The timber was felled by the original farmer, Christopher Walsh, and probably cut by hand with a large cross-cut saw.

The massive wooden beams in the shed were about 30 cm wide and made from logs which were squared up with an equally massive broad axe.

The studs were of a similar dimension. All were fixed together with mortise and tenon joints made by a hand-held mortising axe.

The main hand-made partition wall was made by splitting cut timber into very slender boards with an axe and a mawl — a large wooden mallet — and then nailing boards to the studs.

Roof purlins — similar, but longer than ordinary shingles — were made in the same way.

Some still survive, but are now covered with corrugated iron.

The hay-loft system for feeding cows in the milking stalls below is still partially intact.

Up in the loft, a chaff-cutter was used to cut hay and the feed was then shovelled down a chute and into long feed bins in the milking area.

Standing in the shed, seeing the huge, hand-cut and squared beams conjures up images of the men, their families and their work.

The milking shed still stands testimony to the builder's wish that it be built to last.

The Lawless family also has a collection of furniture made by Walsh which, presumably, he built after working in the shed all day.

Each piece has his initials carved into the wood.

But how would he have found time to do the extra work when, as Frank Lawless pointed out, in those days "they were up and out to work before dawn and home in the dark"?

Today the milking shed is also littered with what, to some, would be piles of junk. To others, it is a fascinating gold mine of artefacts.

There are small, hand-operated butter churns, empty piano boxes from the Brash's Company of 1920 and, of all things, a tin of Griffiths Brothers tea which celebrated Victoria's 100th anniversary! Old farm machinery — such as a superphosphate spreader — was also stored in the shed.


The sole surviving child of the original builder, now 86, still lives in Traralgon — but she has trouble remembering those days, Frank said.

The last of the two Walsh sons used to talk in great detail to Frank about the old dairy before his death four years ago.

"I regret I didn't listen more carefully when I could and write it down," Frank said.

Perhaps that's a worthwhile message for others.
