

Mr. ARTHUR LESLIE HARE, of Morwell, was born in Geelong in 1884, and educated at the Macorna State School. His father settling on land in Narracan, Gippsland, he assisted on the farm until he was 17, when he obtained employment with Mr. George Billingsley, of Morwell, taking a leading part in the latter's road contract work, and staving there for twelve years. He eventually began a livery stable business of his own, which he built up into a very flourishing concern. He assisted in placing the first survey peg in connection with the now famous Yallourn scheme, and he helped to pull out the first truck of brown coal from the old mine. With the advent of the motor car he gradually

changed over to the garage business, selling his livery stable and contracting business and giving the whole of his time to establishing his garage, which is now one of the best of its type in Gippsland, turning over up to 6000 gallons of petrol per month.

He was elected a councillor of the Shire of Morwell in 1930, and is a P.M. of the Morwell Masonic Lodge, president of the local Bowling Club, and ex-president of the local branch of the A.N.A. He is also president of Morwell Traders' Association, and has been president of Morwell Swimming Baths Committee for two years.

His wife was a Miss Nelly Butters, daughter of H. A. Butters, of Morwell, and there is a family of two daughters.

FROM THE APRIL MEETING

Morwell's origin in Devon

SIR — Your issue of March 3 contains a "Gippsland History" article which suggests C. J. Tyers, government surveyor, who in 1842 or 1844 became the first Land Commissioner for the newlycreated District of Gippsland, may have been the person to first name Morwell as distinct from Maryvale and that "he came from a place near Morwell Rocks in Devon".

I would be interested to learn the source of this information as his biography, contained in Vol2 of the Australian Dictionary of Biography, apparently written by a relative, has it that he was born in London. Could it have been that he was London-born but brought up in Devonshire?

Morwell Rocks is in the vicinity of Morwellham on the River Tamar, four miles from the one-time market town of Tavistock, and between 1845 and 1865 the Devon Great Consols Mine near Morwellham was Europe's chief source of copper. The long-derelict workings, buildings, tramways and quays have now been attractively restored as a tourist venue and I happen to have been in correspondence with the founder of the Morwellham Centre over matters of family history relating to the period 1836-66 when my grandfather was land agent and steward for the Duke of Bedford's estates along the Tamar Valley.

I was born at Liskeara on the Cornish side of the border and as a boy used to know the Tavistock area fairly well.

INTRIGUING

Next time you drive along Elgin Street, between White and Wilson Streets, have a close look at number 79.

Located on this residential block are two houses.

Behind the front house is a much older dwelling that looks to be still in reasonable condition. Perhaps this is a bit of Morwell history that members might like to enlarge upon in later newsletters.

Many members will know of the Cranwell family, long term residents of Hazelwood North. Max Cranwell, today runs the family dairy farm which is bordered by Church Road and the main Traralgon - Churchill Road.

Max's father, Mr. Doug Cranwell, passed away in November last year. Like his father, Max maintains a deep affection for the family property. Centrally located in the Hazelwood North area, the farm is one of the few remaining family properties that has not succumbed to the interests of land development.

Atop the highest point of the farm are the remains of the original home which, together with the outbuildings, was destroyed in the 1944 fires. The concrete front door step, bricks from the chimney, fruit trees, twisted remains of agricultural machinery and the original pig sheds are all that's left as testimony to former grace.

Max is keen to explain the family history which he traces back to modest beginnings in Braybrook. Perhaps the Society might consider a visit to the house site on a suitable Spring Sunday. The view of the property from this vantage point on a fine day is worthwhile in itself.

CHANGES ARE BEGINNING - GET THE CAMERA...


