PRESIDENT'S REPORT to the AGM 17th April 2024

We are now in our 63rd year as a Historical Society after a busy past 12 months.

Improvements to our facility over the past year have included-

- -laying carpet in Hare Campbell and Dianne and Don Harle rooms provided by Morwell Bowling Club and Latrobe Council grant
- -finalising kitchen upgrade funded by Federal Government
- -website upgrade funded by Morwell Bowling Club and member donation
- -new library area shelving provided by ENGIE
- -external notice board funded by a member donation.

A recent Latrobe City Trust grant has allowed us to equip our kitchen and establish our 'Step Back in Time Conversation Cafe' providing an opportunity for the community to visit our centre 3 days a month and have a cuppa and nibble whilst sharing stories. After only 3 months, the cafe is very successful.

In addition to visits by community groups we-

- -hosted a Morwell North reunion 12 months ago
- -hosted the Royal Historical Society Victoria regional seminar in August
- -provided a power industry exhibition for CRC, National Power industry Conference in November. This exhibition will remain until the end of May.

Our members continue to attend special events, community days and expos promoting the Society and sharing our history.

A positive partnership with Latrobe City has us researching matters for them including a current project to identify the history of street names and parks and reserves. We were also fortunate to receive a \$2000 grant from Council to offset our rates.

We continuously field enquiries for historical research and are welcoming of regular donations of various historical items, magazines and photos. A significant donation of technical books from ENGIE are now part of our collection.

In addition to our regular Bunnings BBQs, we held a major fundraiser in a Spring Plant Sale in October which was hugely successful.

These funds along with other support has enabled our debt on our building to be reduced to \$30,000. We have another 12 months until the debt needs to be finalised.

We have been fortunate to have had the support of Latrobe City, ENGIE, Morwell Bowling Club, Bunnings, Millers Plumbing, our Corporate and Business sponsors and some very generous members and community members to allow us to operate and reduce our debt.

I wish to thank our wonderful core group of volunteers who support the maintenance and management of this valuable community asset and to all members who assist with the operation of our Society.

I look forward to your ongoing support.

VALE - ELSIE McMASTER 1939-2024

On March 9th 2024 Morwell lost one of their treasures and the Historical Society lost a dedicated member. Elsie and Bruce both grew up in Foster and went to the same school. After High School, Elsie moved to Melbourne where she studied to be a High School teacher at Melbourne University. Bruce was working in Melbourne and he used to drive Foster friends back to Foster on the weekends. It was during these trips that he and Elsie started their courtship. They became engaged and married in Foster in 1964. After University Elsie taught at Foster High, then she moved to Melbourne to be near Bruce and taught at Oakleigh High. Bruce then got the position of Health Inspector with the Morwell Shire and Elsie inquired with Morwell High for a teaching position. Fortunately for her there was a teacher who wanted to teach in Melbourne so Elsie swapped with her.

Later Elsie became Senior Mistress.

When Caroline came along in 1968 Elsie retired from teaching and then Christine and Sharon were born. When the girls were young Elsie taught English to migrants in her lounge room.

The Morwell Historical Society was established by Ivan Maddern in 1962 but when he moved away the Society went into recess. In 1973 the organisation started up again with Elsie and Bruce as members. Elsie was a very capable Secretary for 27 years, from 1984 to 2011 and Editor of the Newsletter for 18 years, from 1984 to 2002. The plate of cake that Elsie brought to the monthly meetings and other events did not last long. In 1993 Elsie and Anne Dettrick wrote the book *Women of the Valley,* about 24 Women in Morwell and District from 1884-1944.

During her Secretarial years Elsie organised numerous excursions for members.

MORWELL GOLF CLUB

In September 1908, Dr J.S. McLean convened a meeting at which it was decided to form the Morwell Golf Club.

First Officers were:

President - Dr Mclean

Vice Presidents - Rev. Fr. E.J. Coleman (RC) and Mr W. Applegate

Captain - Dr Mclean

Treasurer - Mr C.R. Aherin (Manager Bank of Australasia)

Committee - Messrs. Davey (Murdoch's Hotel) Smythe (Cricketers' Arms Hotel) and Buckland

Secretary - Mr H.H. Brown

A course was laid out in "Kleine's Paddock" about where the SEC Workshops were, in Electra Avenue. After about 18 months it moved to the other side of the railway line to Buckley's Hill and rented land from Vin Hourigan. The course had 9 holes and the first tee was beside the Princes Highway east of the Uniting Church. The first clubhouse was situated at the rear of F. Samuel's home on the site of the current Morwell Hotel (The Top Pub).

The course was very rough, with cow droppings, kangaroo grass, tussocks and the greens were described as "sand scrapes".

Hourigan's Land was sold off to the Housing Commission in 1949 and the Golf Club was forced to close. The game of golf was not played in Morwell for another 26 years.

The present Golf Club had its beginnings in 1965, when a public meeting was called in Morwell Council Chambers to judge what interest there was in establishing a Golf Course in Morwell. 69 people attended.

A steering committee was formed comprising of Ron Liddicut, Alan Grieve, Tom Stillman, Bill Youngman, John Bull and Gordon Lawrence. In 1969 a meeting of debenture holders was held with the object of refunding all debentures and winding up the steering committee because of the unavailability of suitable golf course land. The meeting rejected this unanimously and requested the Steering Committee to make a concerted effort to find suitable land. By early 1970 preliminary arrangements had been made with the SEC for a 40 year lease of about 165 acres of land north of Crinigan Road.

A meeting held in November 1971 a constitution was adopted and elected the following office bearers:

Campbell R. Cook J. Gray F. Hall C. Howes W. Howes W. Warren	The first AGM was held on 4th December 1972 at the "Karma". Shortly after this, a \$50,000 Morwell Golf Club Cooperative was formed for course construction and was fully subscribed. At the AGM held in 1972 the club had 338 members even though there was no course. On 12th May 1975 two Yallourn houses were purchased and located side by side. These houses were
		connected, a dining room was created and with further

modifications the Morwell Golf Club had a Clubhouse in a wonderful setting.

Following many tireless hours, days and months of work by numerous volunteers and paid staff, the course was officially opened on Saturday 5th March 1977 by Mr W De Campo, Assistant General Manager SECV, (Operations) with Pat Keenan as President.



On 3rd July 1975, the Associates side of the club was formed. They were ably led by the following committee:

JOHN AMEY 1811-1894

One of the first people to be buried in Hazelwood Cemetery was John Amey, a convict, who was transported to Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania) in 1838.

John Amey was born in 1811 in Sandford in Devonshire. Aged 26 he was tried in Dorset for feloniously stealing a carving knife to the value of two shillings and sentenced to 15 years. In Tasmania he worked on a farming property and in 1941 he was issued a 'ticket of leave' as a reward for meritorious conduct of a 'larceny' committee in his master's house in 1838.


In 1841 John married Margaret Peers-Robinson in Hobart and they had a daughter, Charlotte Louise in 1842, the same year that John received his certificate of freedom.

In 1850 John is recorded as a farmer at Alberton on the coast of Gippsland.

John married Eleanor Stafford and they travelled to Hobart in 1854 to bring back Charlotte. Eleanor died in Foster in 1887 and was buried in the Foster Cemetery. (Ellen on her head stone)

John married Barbara Saunders nee Powell in Fitzroy in 1889 and they selected land to farm beside the Franklin River at Corner Inlet.

Charlotte married James Simmons in 1859 in Alberton and they had 10 children who were all born at Alberton. The family moved to Foster and Martha died when she was 13 in 1891. James died in 1918 and Charlotte died in 1920. Martha, James and Charlotte are all buried together in an unmarked grave beside Ellen in Foster Cemetery.



John died in 1894 and he is buried in Hazelwood Cemetery
